## Brief Overview of the Fellowship Curriculum:

Course Design for Student Success is available as an intensive or immersive experience for 4 weeks or as a less intensive experience for 8 weeks. Both cover all 4 modules.

#### Module 1

#### Course Vision and Learning Goals

Explore and practice the starting point for course design —identifying course goals and establishing course-level learning outcomes that creates a course where all students Belong. You will use a Course Map Template as a guide to your course development process. Share outcomes with your Circle and give and receive feedback on course goals.

#### Module 3

## Examine and Reflect on the Importance of Course Alignment

Learn about aligning the learning outcomes, assessment, and learning activities in the context of the backward design process. Effective alignment of inclusive course elements — learning outcomes, resources, activities, and assessments — will promote students' success and the achievement of intended learning outcomes. Give feedback to your peers on their work, and receive feedback on yours.

#### Module 2

#### Establish Enabling Learning Outcomes

These outcomes describe the path the students must take to meet the course-level outcomes and provide the foundation for learning activities and assessments, creating a sense of Belonging for all students. Then, write or revise a course description based on your learning outcomes. Give feedback to your peers on their work, and receive feedback on yours.

### Module 4

# Examine Learning Activity Design and Associated Teaching Practices

Build skills and knowledge around evidence-based teaching practices and Universal Design to ensure all students succeed. Focus on aligning the learning outcomes, assessment, and learning activities in the context of the backward design process and bring these elements together in a teaching plan. Reflect on your course design and what you learned during the Circle experience.

"It has been fantastic to receive real-time feedback on lesson plans and implement and reflect on changes that could be made ASAP. I often found myself not reflecting so readily which lead to an unfortunate delay in making improvements, but the interaction with the fellows really helped me engage in more timely ways with the students.
